Course Description: The primary purpose of this course is to provide a basic understanding of microeconomic theory. Economics at its core is the study of decisions that have to be made in order to manage scarce resources available to us. Microeconomics is the branch of economics, where these decisions made at the individual level (i.e., by individual consumers or individual firms) after cost and benefit analysis of different alternative use of resources.

When we talk about the economy, we are referring to the marketplace or system in which these decisions interact with one another. In this course, you will learn how and why these decisions are made and how they affect one another in the economy. To do so, we start with the basic ideas of tradeoffs, opportunity cost, and the gains from trade, we will study how the market forces of supply and demand cause prices to be what they are. We will see the sense in which market economies are efficient, and the way governments can make our economy less or more efficient. Time permitting; we will have an introductory study on the frontier of microeconomics: Behavioral Economics, where factors affecting human behavior and decision-making are studied with more scrutiny.

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days.
