Examinations:

- 1. Tests and exams **WILL** involve multiple choice questions.
- 2. The midterm examination will cover the material in Chapters 5 11 inclusive, and the exam will be held during lecture time at the start of class March 3.
- 3. The final examination will cover all course material but will be heavily weighted towards material that was not dealt with in the midterm. The final exam will last two hours, and will be scheduled by the Registrar. ~75 questions on Chapters 12 to 17, 25 questions on Chapters 5 to 11.
- 4. Non-programmable calculators **WILL** be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.
- 5. Students who are unable to write the midterm because of an illness, family emergency or religious observance will have the midterm weight shifted to the final examination. Documentation MUST be provided.
- 6. Assignments, tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The marks are then added using the weights indicated above and converted into letter grades. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
