Description:

This course is the first of two courses (ECON 359 is the second) designed to cover the basics of macroeconomics. We will study the aggregate behaviour of consumers and firms in both the short run and the long run.

Calculus is not required for this course and will not be used, but high school level algebra will be used. In particular, you must be able to solve a system of equations as well as perform graphical analysis.

Macroeconomic theory is important to the study of economics as well as an understanding of the Canadian and world economies. By the end of the course, it is my expectation that students will be able to perform short and long run analyses of economic events. Those who cannot demonstrate these abilities should not expect to pass.

Course Outline:

The course will follow the textbook. However, some material may be added or removed based on time constraints.

- 1. Introduction (Ch. 1, 2)
- 2. Long-Run Economic Analysis (Ch. 3 6)
- 3. Business Cycles and Short Run Economic Analysis (Ch. 8 12)
- 4. Macroeconomic Policy (Ch. 13 15)

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

The aim of the course is to develop your ability to solve problems and provide a general understanding of macroeconomics. As such, the midterm and final will consist of problems. You will not be expected to memorize definitions, but you will need to demonstrate an understanding of the definitions covered in lecture.

You will have at least one week to complete each of the four assignments. Collaboration is encouraged; however, each student must write up and submit their own answers. Groups of students handing in identical assignments are unacceptable.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
