Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

The main objective of this course is to provide the student with an understanding of the role of petroleum in the world economy. The development and significance of the oil industry over time will be reviewed and prospects for oil in the world's economic future will be evaluated. Basic analytical concepts such as supply, demand, perfect and imperfect competition will be used to explain the workings of the global petroleum industry. There will be particular emphasis on the influence of market power on the world's petroleum industry over time.

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

The midterm examination on March 14 WILL involve multiple choice questions. Non-programmable calculators WILL NOT be allowed during the writing of the midterm examination.

There will be a Registrar scheduled final examination, held in a classroom, lasting 2 hours. Non-programmable calculators WILL be allowed during the writing of the final examination. A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal.
