Course Outline:

Public finance examines the role of government(s) in the economy. Combining theory, applications, and policy, this course focuses on the two central roles of governments: public expenditures and taxation. From a theoretical perspective, this course looks at the *microeconomic* roles of governments, namely the allocation of resources and the distribution of income. Applications and policies address important and topical issues such as health care, employment insurance, education and progressive income taxation.

Part Four: Public Expenditure in Canada

Part Five: A Framework for Tax Analysis

Part Six: The Canadian Revenue System

Tests

There will be two tests this semester; each test will be approximately 75 minutes in length and may consist of theoretical, mathematical, graphical, applied, and/or “readings” questions. **Make-up quizzes will not be given.** In cases of documented illness, documented family emergency, or documented religious observance, the weight of the test will be equally divided between the remaining test and the final exam (or allotted to the final examination in the case of test #2).

Participation

Participation includes attendance, participation in class, and demonstrated familiarity with the readings. Note: Each lecture missed (without documented reasons for the absence) results in a 5% deduction.

Final Examination*

The final exam is cumulative and is 2 hours in length as scheduled by the Registrar’s office. More information will be provided towards the end of the term. Note: You may replace the final exam with a group presentation on one of the Public Finance topics identified in the text. The criteria and expectations about the group presentation will be discussed in the first lecture on January 15, 2015.

All assessments are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis and converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated below. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will apply:
