Course Outline:

This course examines how variables and institutions with international linkages can influence an economy?s macroeconomic behaviour. The first half of the course concentrates on specific theoretical analysis: balance of payments, the role of money and relative interest rates, exchange rate models/regimes and their effect on price levels and output. The second half focuses more on current policy-oriented issues in open economy macroeconomics. Examples include; what causes currency crises? are currency boards (or dollarization) the best solution for countries facing currency crises? do capital controls work? is bipolarity of exchange rate regimes a fact? does the international financial architecture need to be reformed? should the United Kingdom join the European Monetary Union?

We will cover Chapters 12 ? 20, & 22 (due to summer session time constraints we may not finish all chapters). Midterm 1 will at the start of class for 1 hour 15 minutes, and cover Chapters 12 ? 15.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

There will be 2 homework assignments that will be due by 4:30 pm on the due date. No late homework will be accepted. An answer key to homework assignments will be provided.

There will be one midterm tests and one 2-hour Registrar-scheduled final examination, which will be held in a classroom.
