#### **Course Description:**

"Rents-how to spot them, grab them, hang onto them. That's what strategy should be." The objective of this course is to provide an introduction to the theory of industrial organization. Industrial organization is concerned with the functioning of imperfectly competitive markets and the behaviour of firms in these markets. It attempts to address the following questions: 1) Why are markets organized as they are? 2) How does the organization affect the way in which firms behave? 3) How does the behaviour of firms influence the structure or organization of markets? The focus is on the strategic behaviour of firms. How can firms create monopoly rents or profits and maintain them? What are the social implications of these kinds of behaviour? The last question naturally leads to issues of economic regulation and antitrust policy. Econ 471 is a course in regulatory economics and Econ 571 is a course in competition policy. Econ 471 is a prerequisite to both.

#### **Summer Internship in Regulatory Economics:**

Students who complete Econ 471 and Econ 477 may be eligible for the Summer Internship Program in Regulatory Economics. This program has placed students with regulated firms and regulators in Calgary since the summer of 2000. Details on the program can be found in the call for applications from previous years. Tests and exams will not involve multiple choice questions. Non-programmable calculators WILL be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

The exact date for the in-class midterm will be announced at least one week in advance.

Students unable to write exams because of documented illness, family emergency, religious observance, or a university-sanctioned event will have the weight shifted to the final examination; otherwise a grade of zero will be assigned.

Students will be given at least one week to complete each assignment. Late assignments will never be accepted. In cases of documented illness, family emergency, religious observance, or a university-sanctioned event, extra weight will be given to the final examination.

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.
