Course Outline:

The purpose of this course is to advance students understanding of theoretical and applied issues in econometrics. Providing students with a strong foundation to carry through with graduate level study in econometrics and learn the skills sought after in the business community. The course takes a broad approach to topics covered but will also focus on current exciting econometric issues. Students are expected to have working knowledge of some econometric software; the course instructor will use STATA 15 for class examples. For each topic covered, a detailed reading list will be posted on D2L.

Course topics; General linear model, GMM estimation, model specification and evaluation, Testing, Causal evaluation and estimation, Panel data, Time series models, Forecasting, Big Data

Prerequisites/corequisites:

Econ 497 starts at a level that assumes familiarity with the material covered in Econ 495 and Stats 213, including proficiency at mathematical statistics and calculus. Presentations will use matrix algebra. Computers in the Tri-Faculty computer lab (SS018) are equipped with STATA software.
