Thomas Schelling, Micromotives and Macrobehaviour

This course focuses on interpersonal externalities of the sort analyzed in Schelling's book, and in particular on the sometimes surprising macro implications of differing micro motives. We will work our way through Schelling's book, in three weekly session of 1 hour. Then we will look at some applications of Schelling's analytical framework, including the book by Timur Kuran listed above. There will be three 1 hour sessions devoted to applications. Students will write a report of 2 to 4 pages for each of these weekly sessions. Finally, students will be asked to write a term paper of approximately 15

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to 20 pages in which they present their own work on an original research topic to be negotiated with the instructor.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

The six weekly reports on assigned reading will account for 50% of the students mark, and the original research paper will account for the other 50%. There will be no examinations.

All assignments will be marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
