Course Description:

Research Methods (I and II) will focus on developing students' skills in evaluating their own research and that of others. The course will focus on how to choose a research topic, how to develop an appropriate methodology, and how to evaluate the research contributions of others. As part of the course, students are expected to attend the departmental seminars (both the internal Wednesday seminars, when appropriate, and the Friday visiting speaker seminars).

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes:

The goal of this course is to provide you with the tools necessary to undertake independent research, beyond the skills developed in your courses field specific courses. In the fall, our focus will be on developing a clear research question and an appropriate methodology for studying that question. Of particular importance will be the following dates when we will be having lectures and workshops (rather than the Wednesday department seminar): September 18, October 9, October 30, November 27.

Course Outline:

The course will be divided into three broad sections. During the first section we will discuss how to develop a research question and how to conduct a literature review on that topic. The second section will focus on developing an appropriate research approach or methodology to assess your research question. The final portion of the course will focus on developing your writing and presentation skills as they pertain to your research.

Prerequisites/corequisites: Enrollment in the MA Economics program (course-based and thesis-based)

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

There are no exams for this course. Students will be evaluated based on their completion of three seminar referee reports and two research reports of their own choosing.

For the seminar reports, students will write reports on three papers presented in the Wednesday and Friday seminars. These reports should evaluate the paper, the presentation, and provide a thoughtful analysis of the research contributions. The reports can be submitted to the instructor at any time during the fall term but all reports must be submitted by December 13. Late assignments will not be accepted.

Students will also write research reports on two research questions of their choosing. Developing these reports will be the focus of the course and we will have several ungraded assignments to help move this process along. The reports should identify a research question, explain why the topic worth researching, provide a cursory literature review, and develop an appropriate methodology. The first report will be due November 1; the second report will be due December 13. Late assignments will not be accepted.
