Assignments:

Assignments will be completed and submitted online using Mindtap/Aplia. Details concerning the submission of assignments will be explained in class. Due dates will be announced well in advance.

All assignments will be due at 6:00 PM on the due date. Late assignments will not be accepted under any circumstances. Technical problems can be expected to occur with computer systems and internet availability. As such it is a good idea not to wait until the last minute to submit your assignment. Technical problems will not justify shifting the assignment weight to the final exam

Emails regarding the assignments should be directed to the teaching assistants (TAs), who will be assigned to this course.

Emails regarding Mindtap/Aplia should be directed to the providers of Mindtap. I am unable to help with computer issues.

Examinations:

Examinations will consist primarily of multiple choice questions and may contain essay style/problem solving questions. The Midterm exam and Final exam are intended to be challenging (they are "tests" of your understanding of the material).

The midterm examination will be held during the lecture time.

The final examination will last for two hours and will be scheduled by the Registrar. **The exam must** be completed during the specified time. Extra time will not be given for any reason.

The use of a non-programmable calculator during exams is permitted. **The use of graphing calculators, cell phones and computing devices is not permitted.**

Grading:

The midterm exams and the final exam are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. The following letter grade equivalences will apply:

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

Notes:

- 3. Students should be aware that no "make-up" midterms will be given. Any student who finds it necessary to miss the midterm must notify the instructor in advance and produce a valid medical certificate or other required documentation in order to have the weighting adjusted. This adjustment will result in the final exam counting for 80% of the final grade and the assignments counting for 20% of the final grade.
- 4. A deferred final exam will not be given except in cases of extreme personal emergency. If, for such a reason, a deferred final exam is allowed by the Registrar's Office, it will not be given before the scheduled deferred exam date. Also, deferred final examinations do not have to cover the same material or have the same format as the regular final examination. They may also contain short/long answer questions.
- 5. Examinations will not be given prior to the scheduled date.
- 6. Students will not be given extra time to complete tests and exams.
- 7. The classroom is a no-cell-phone-zone. The use of cell phones for any purpose in class is prohibited. Computers may only be used for note-taking purposes.
- 8. Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded term work (test, assignment.) should discuss their work with the Instructor *within fifteen days* of the work being returned to the class.
