Course Outline:

Economics 301 (Intermediate Economic Theory? Microeconomics I) builds the foundations of microeconomic theory. It provides a systematic way of understanding human behaviour by developing models. Emphasis on the everyday applications and policy implications of economics makes this more than a pure theory course.

Mathematical and graphical analysis will routinely be used in class. There is no calculus requirement for this course but Mathematics 249 or 251 is a prerequisite for the following course, Economics 357 (Intermediate Economic Theory? Microeconomics II).

Class attendance is not mandatory. However, students are responsible for all material covered in lectures. The textbook and lectures are complements, not substitutes for each other.

There will be no make-up or deferred examinations. Students may not write examinations early. If a student has legitimate reason for missing an exam (e.g., documented illness, family emergency or religious observance), then the weight of the missed exam is shifted to the final exam; otherwise a grade of zero is assigned.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a student to pass the course as a whole.

Non-programmable calculators WILL be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

There will be a Registrar scheduled final examination, lasting 2 hours.

Tests and exams MAY involve multiple choice questions.
