Whichever of these methods yields the higher grade will then be utilized, but students must pass the final exam to pass the course as a whole.

The tests will be held in class on the date indicated. The time and location of the final exam, which will be two hours in length, will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office and held in a classroom. Exam questions will not consist of multiple choice questions. The use of a simple nonprogrammable calculator during tests and the final exam is permitted.

The tests and the final exam are marked on a numerical basis. The grades are then added using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

- Make-up tests and deferred tests will not be given. Deferred final examinations do not have to cover the same material or have the same format as the regular final examination.
- Examinations will not be given prior to the scheduled date.
