Course Outline:

The objective of this course is to describe some basic mathematical methods and their applications to economics. In particular, we will be concerned with elementary techniques in algebra, single and multivariable calculus, unconstrained and constrained optimization, comparative static analysis, equilibrium analysis.

In addition, there will be a substantial amount of homework. The homework will not be graded, but will be very important for the exams. The final exam will be scheduled by the Registrar, held in the classroom and will last three hours. It will be a comprehensive examination of all material covered in the course. All exams will be closed-book ones.

Non-programmable calculators will be allowed during the writing of tests or final examinations.

Tests and exams will involve multiple choice questions.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, and then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
