#### **Course Outline:**

This course combines fundamental empirical trade analyses with micro-economic based theoretical research, to articulate the globalization phenomenon. It provides a detailed explanation of trade flows, gains from trade and trade policy measures and goes on to consider issues such as: strategic trade policy in the presence of imperfect competition; trade and technological change; trade-related aspects of intellectual property; and trade, trade policy and the environment.

Economics 425 complements Economics 321, "The Global Trading System", by providing more breadth and depth. While Economics 321 is not a prerequisite to Economics 425, it does provide very helpful background. Students must either complete ECON 357 prior to or concurrently with ECON 425 OR complete ECON 309 prior to ECON 425.

## **Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:**

All students must comply with the regulations published in the University Calendar concerning "Intellectual Honesty," "Examinations," etc.

Students must successfully pass the final examination to pass the course. Students will normally be evaluated in accordance with the marking scheme given below:
