Course Outline:

The student will learn about research methods and analytical approaches in applied energy economics. The course will equip the student with an understanding of the essential business and policy concepts in applied energy economics relating to crude oil and liquids, natural gas and electricity. Current topics of importance such as the oil sands, electricity deregulation and LNG will be covered.
