### **Course Outline:**

In this course you will have a chance to put to work the mathematical tools and economic concepts that you have learned in other courses. We will spend the course developing and exploring the basic concepts of microeconomic theory, including rational choice, partial and general equilibrium models, dynamic models, non-cooperative game theory and the economics of information. The emphasis is very definitely on learning by doing: there will be assignments every two weeks, they will be quite demanding, and your performance on these assignments will be given a heavy weight in determining your course mark. You will be required to use most of the mathematical techniques that you learned in Econ 387 and 389, and all of the core concepts of microeconomic theory. Most importantly, success in this course requires significant mathematical sophistication. We will rely on Osborne's textbook, and on selected journal articles for modeling approaches. Students are expected to work through the assigned readings on their own. Lectures will be devoted to problem solving and model development.

## **Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:**

Midterm: 25% Final Examination: 25% Homework Assignments: 50%

Exams and homework assignments are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis, then converted to letter grades. The course grade is then calculated using the weights indicated above. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:
