Course Outline:

This course will build on the University of Calgary course on International Trade, Economics 425, and examine contemporary issues in international trade policy at an advanced undergraduate level.

- 1. **Breadth Component 12 Reading Summaries:** There will be 12 twelve 600 word reading summaries (approximately two double spaced pages). The readings will be based mainly on the 48 chapters in the Kerr and Gaisford Handbook. (The entire handbook will be covered.) The summaries should highlight the main themes and issues arising from the readings.
- 2. **Depth Component Term Paper:** There will be a 5000 word term paper (approximately 15 double spaced pages) addressing a trade policy topic to be determined in consultation with the instructor. Topics will typically be chosen from an area of student interest in the readings.

Notes:

- Students seeking reappraisal of a piece of graded work should discuss this with the instructor within seven days of the work being returned. At the instructor's prerogative, a remedial assignment for partial credit may be requested of students who have attempted a piece of work without achieving a passing grade.
- It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
