Course Outline:

This course provides an overview of topics in health economics. The aim of the course is to introduce students to economic principles and techniques which are of use in analyzing and planning health policy, in particular the delivery of health services, and for understanding the health behaviour of individuals. Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

Due Dates	% of Final Mark	Evaluation Method
#1: Sept. 25	20%	Media Excitement (3 to 5 pages) - you will identify and summarize one article from a newspaper or widely read periodical that has gained considerable attention from the public. In addition to the summary, you will critique the piece assessing the quality of the economic argument and the extent to which the claims are based on economic evidence.
#2 Tuesday Nov. 13	30%	What Can Health Services Research Gain from Health Economics? Choose a research topic, or research area, where the published work has not been carried out by economists. You will want to pick a well defined topic since you will need to find 5 to 10 articles published on this topic over the last 5 years. Where possible, choose the work considered to be "seminal" or exemplary of the highest quality for the area. Summarize the major findings, sources of evidence and policy implications of the work. Next you will assess what the underlying economics of the work appears to be. After that, you will identify key economic insights with respect to research program design (e.g. sampling), and/or data analysis, and/or interpretation of evidence that are missing from the work. Finally you will describe how you would do a study

		that addresses the claims that you have previously made.
#3: During Final Exam period Dec.10- 19	30%	Final Examination
#4	20%	Class Participation – based on attendance, interactions/contributions in class, and demonstrated familiarity with course readings.

Late Assignments:

- Assignments are due on the specified date by 9 AM. Students who hand in assignments late will be penalized 10% per day for handing in late. Assignments that are handed in 7 calendar days or more after the due date will be refused and the students assigned a score of zero for the assignment.
